



### The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

From the earliest centuries there have been stories, traditions and artistic impressions of what the Assumption of Our Lady could mean. The feast itself originated in

Jerusalem before the fifth century as the “Falling-Asleep of the Mother of God.” It was adopted in Rome in the mid-seventh century and was renamed the “Assumption” in the next century.

1950, Pope Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary into heaven as a divinely revealed dogma, saying “that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory”. However, this left open the question of whether Mary died before her Assumption. But the more common opinion of the early Fathers was that she did die.

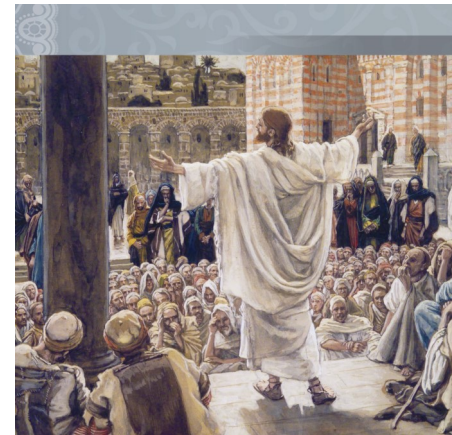

**20<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time**

It is only a few weeks since we heard Jesus advising his disciples to greet people with the words, 'Peace to this house!' We associate Jesus with peace rather than division. When he greets the disciples after the Resurrection, his first words are 'Peace be with you'. Yet, here he is talking about division, even within households and families.

At the time Luke was writing his Gospel, the early Christian community was experiencing division, and many households were torn apart over what to believe. It was Jesus' desire that the flame of his Good News would burn brightly - 'I came to bring fire to the earth' - but

not everyone was ready for his radical vision, and division was the natural and painful consequence. We still live in a divided world when it comes to Jesus' message. Different factions in the Church argue and swipe at each other, often in very unchristian ways, lacking genuine respect or dialogue. Parents and grandparents can be hurt when younger family members drift away from the faith or have a different way of practicing it. Some people walk away because they feel unwelcome or betrayed by the Church.

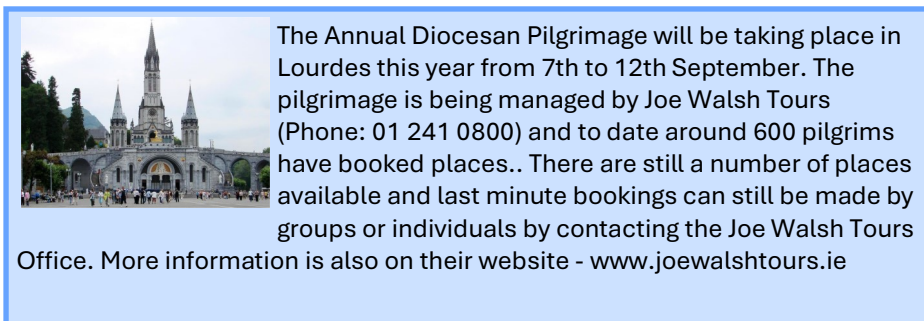
A certain amount of conflict is unavoidable as we navigate our changing faith landscape, but we do have a choice. Do we allow anger and hurt to shape our interactions, or do we try to listen and to heal, as Jesus did in his encounters with others? None of us has all the answers, but we seek and move forward together hoping that a better world is ahead, and that Jesus is guiding us ever closer to the peace he promised.
